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ORGANIZATIONAL PROFILE





Pagasa ng Pinoy Mutual Benefit Association (PPMBAI) is an non-stock, non-profit, mutual benefit association that serves as the insurance provider of borrowers of Pagasa Philippines Lending Company, Inc. (PPLCI) and Pagasa ng Masang Pinoy Microfinance, Inc. (PMPMI).

PPMBAI was formed as a response to the need of the borrowers of PPLCI and PMPFI to provide them insurance. In 2012, PPLCI management decided to act on the demand and started exploring options. A partner-agent didn't push thru due to the constraint of the product that it offers, thus, the management decided to put up its own Microinsurance Mutual Benefit Association (MI-MBA) in April 2012.

The association was registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) as a nonstock, not-for-profit association on December 28, 2012. It was granted a license by the Insurance Commission (IC) on May 22, 2013 to engage as a mutual benefit association that extends benefits and services for the welfare and financial security of its members and their families in the form of death benefits, sickness benefits, retirement savings, and loan redemption assistance and ensuring continued access to benefits and resources.

The Association actively involves the members in the direct management of the Association including the implementation of policies and procedures geared towards sustainability and improved services.

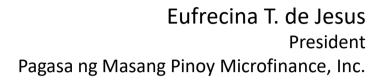

Credit Life Insurance Plan (CLIP)

This insurance coverage is offered to all Members and allows PPMBAI to insure the individual borrowers of PPFCI for an amount equal to the loan granted. Premium is Php5.00/Php1,000.00.

Above 6 Months

Retirement Savings Fund (RSF)

Members contribute as part of their retirement fund. Minimum contribution is Php130.00 every semi-annual. This fund earns an interest of 1.00% per annum.

Hospital Care Assistance (HCA)

HOSPITALIZATION CARE ASSISTANCE (HCA)

OPTION 1 - PREMIUM = Php100 - MEMBERS HCA

OPERATIONS HIGHLIGHTS

IVIEWBERSHIP AND SUBSCRIPTION

PPMBAI membership has steadily increased over the thirteen years of its operation. As of December 31, 2024, the Association's total membership stands at 298,619, insuring about 800,000 individuals including dependents. This reflects a 39% increase in membership compared to 2023.

Looking into individual subscriptions to PPMBAI's services, the Basic Life Insurance Plan (BLIP) has the highest number of subscriptions at 331,684, followed closely by the Credit Life Insurance Plan (CLIP) with 331,684, and the Retirement Savings Fund (RSF) with 294,564 subscriptions.



COLLECTION

The increase in membership and subscriptions also resulted in higher fee collections. Overall, premium collections across all products registered growth.

For BLIP, collections rose from ₱226.9 million in 2023 to ₱227.1 million in 2024, reflecting an increase of 18%.

For CLIP, premium collections increased by 29%, from ₱47.2 million in 2023 to ₱61 million in 2024.

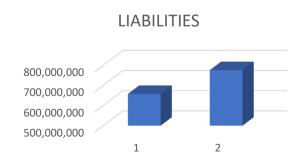
For the RSF, collections grew by 11%, rising from ₱70 million in 2023 to ₱78 million in 2024.

For the HCA, collections grew by 26%, rising from ₱75 million in 2023 to ₱95 million in 2024.

ASSETS AND LIABILITIES



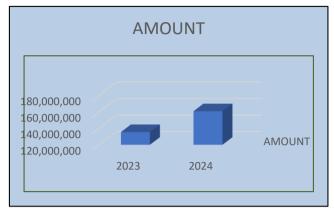


The total assets of PPMBAI as of December 31, 2024 is at Php960,302.714. It increased by 21% from the previous year's assets of Php796,178,450. Liabilities increased as well. From Php657,416,491 in 2023, PPMBAI's liabilities by 2024 was Php775,369,970 an increase of 18%.

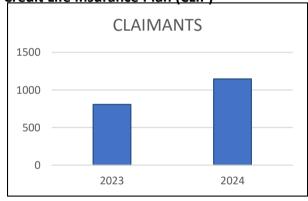


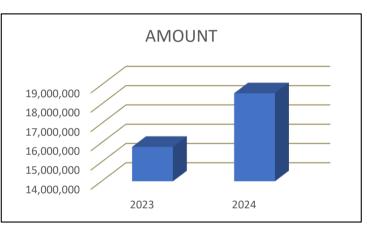
Benefit claims particularly for BLIP has increased substantially over the years. In 2023, 106,813 individual members and their dependents benefited from a total claim of Php135,354,320. In 2024, the number of claims rose to 130,882 with a total paid amount of Php160,595,117. From 2023 to 2024, the payment of claims increased by 18.64% and the number of claims increased by 22.53%.

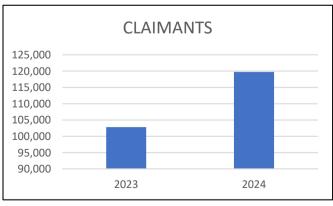

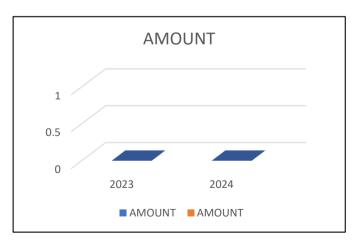




In terms of CLIP, from 808 claimants in 2023 it increased to 1146 in 2024. From 2023 to 2024, the amount of claims paid rose by 18% and the number of claims paid rose by 22%.

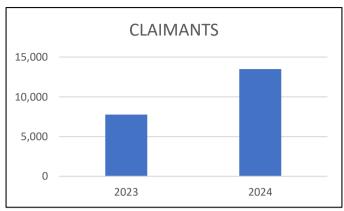
Retirement Savings Fund (RSF)

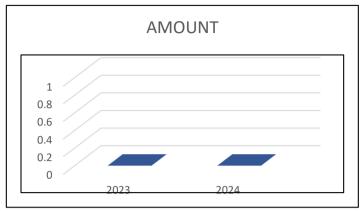




RSF payments remained stable during the first two years of operation. However, from 2023 to 2024, the number of claims paid increased by 16%, while the total amount of claims paid rose by 9%.

Hospital Care Assistance (HCA)

Benefit claims particularly for CLIP has increased substantially over the years. In 2023, 7,767 individual members and their dependents benefited from a total claim of Php14,109,685. In 2024, the number of claims rose to 13,495 with a total paid amount of Php19,874,679. From 2023 to 2024, the payment of claims increased by 41% and the number of claims increased by 74%.

CORPORATE GOVERNANCE

As the Association continues to grow both in membership and assets, there is a need to regularly monitor the effectiveness of governance and management structure in place. More so that the Association operates based on the members' trust.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

At the helm of the governance function is PPMBAI's Board of Trustees. The Board of Trustees is composed of 9 members, two (2) of which are Independent Trustees. The Board of Trustees are elected during the Annual General Meeting thru proxy voting. The Board holds its regular meeting once every quarter (four times a year). In 2024, the Board met four times to discuss and decide on matters concerning the Association.

The Board is responsible for overseeing the Association's business, reviewing and approving policies and strategic and financial plans and annual budgets, establishing systems of checks and balances, and reviewing adequacy of internal control systems in place.

CORPORATE GOVERNANCE

The independent trustee is a person who has no connection, relationship or position with PPMBAI which could or could reasonably perceived to materially interfere with the exercise of his or her responsibilities. Mr. Ricardo Lirio and Ms. Reena Obillo were our independent trustee since 2013.

Governance Manual and Code of Ethics

PPMBAI has already developed and uploaded its Governance Manual in the Company Website.

The association also adopted a Code of Conduct and Ethics that is required to be adhered to by all trustees, officers and employees of PPMBAI. It describes the behavioral standards expected to meet the goals of the association and regulators.

Financial Performance Indicators

PPMBAI fully complied with the financial policies of the Insurance Commission (IC). It complied with the Risk Base Ratio (RBC) this year at around 196%.

Commitment to Good Governance

PPMBAI is committed to the principles and best practices contained in the Manual of Good Governance, Association's By-Laws, and Articles of Incorporation. The Board remains transparent and accountable to its members and shall manage with utmost integrity.

The Board of Trustees and the Management Team will always implement the Code of Good Governance.

Audits

In selecting its external auditor, PPMBAI fully complied with the Insurance Commission's Circular No. 29-2009. For 2018, the association's financial statements were audited by its approved external auditor, Sycip, Gorres & Velayo (SGV) for the amount of Three Hundred Thirty Two Thousand Six Hundred Forty Pesos (Php332,640.00)

Risk Management

The Risk Management of PPMBAI provides guidelines to the Board of Trustees, Officers and Management to properly address risk that affects the association's operations. It is periodically reviewed and assessed by the Board of Trustees.

Supplier

PPMBAI has a Procurement Policy that covers the selection, bidding and approval process for the selection of suppliers.

Board Policy Review

As part of our commitment to implement Good Corporate Governance, the Board always reviews the association's vision, mission and corporate goals. The Board sees that that the vision, mission and goals of the association are still aligned with its programs and operations.

Environment-Friendly Value Chain

PPMBAI assures that all environmental and social consciousness is incorporated in our operation on a daily basis. This is for the benefit of all stakeholders, employees and community members.

Policy on Dividends

PPMBAI does not declare dividends to members. Its income goes directly to members' benefits through an increase in the guaranty fund. In compliance with the Insurance Code, PPMBAI refunds 50 percent of members' premium contributions when they withdraw membership. PPMBAI also releases 100 percent of members' accumulated retirement savings upon reaching exit age or upon withdrawal of membership. Benefits could also be in the form of product reinsurance, scholarships and other financial assistance to those affected by calamities.

Non-Financial Performance Indicators

PPMBAI is committed with its goals to provide claims settlements within 10 working days upon receipt of complete from anywhere in the Philippines.

Protecting the Whistle Blower

PPMBAI disseminated among its officers, employees and members with regard to its policy on the whistle-blowers. The policy involved in maintaining the confidentiality of the whistle-blower and validating the claims and providing protection from any retaliation or harassment.

Related Party Transaction

PPMBAI adopted and started enforcing during the year a policy to disclose related party transactions between PPMBAI and any of its partner organizations and related "party". Related party includes: (a) members of PPMBAI's Board of Trustees, sister organization PPFC and PMPMI; (b) PPMBAI General Manager and key officers, including anyone who directly reports to the Board of Trustees; and (c) Any person whose judgement or decisions could be influenced as a consequence of an arrangement.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY

PPMBAI held its 4th Annual General Assembly last June 2017 in three different occasions. The first leg for Luzon was held in PPMBAI's Head Office in Quezon City and the second leg for Mindanao was held in Middleton Hotel in Cagayan de Oro City and the third leg was held in Iloilo City.

It was attended by 137 proxy representatives of the total membership of PPMBAI composed of 81 from Luzon, 19 from Visayas and 37 from Mindanao.

The President Mr. Genaro Kong and Treasurer Ms. Zeny de Jesus presented their President and Treasurer's Report respectively. In the presentations, Mr. Kong highlighted the gains of the Association from its inception to 2017. He also presented the strategic directions the Association is taking. Ms. Zeny de Jesus presented the financial status of the Association. Other members of the BOT were also present during the GA.
